Participants will improve their skills in inclusive deliberation during conflict. As we strive for a culture of inclusive deliberation, we must first be equipped with communication skills to understand the drivers of the dispute and avoid escalation. The primary steps in doing so include:

- becoming more self-aware and engaged listeners;
- learning to assess the conversational needs of others;
- recognizing the connections between diversity, effective dialogue, and organizational improvement and excellence;
- learning strategies for making disagreements generative and responsive to individual needs; and
- building a vibrant and highly participatory community where people can present ideas, needs, and concerns clearly while respectfully and empathetically listening to others.
