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Africa

Agahozo-Shalom Youth Village Fellows Program in Rwanda

The Village Fellows program of the Agahozo-Shalom Youth Village places international volunteers ("Fellows") at our site in Rwanda as staff. Fellows spend ~11 months living and working in the Village; they are selected to work in specific professional roles and work together with Rwandan staff to support existing programs. They become an integral part of the staff team that enables the Village to fulfill its goal of providing a nurturing home and exemplary formal and informal education to our kids.

Professional roles are identified annually by Village staff and have included roles supporting the ASYV visitor program, communications, health & wellness, English language learning, career development, information technology, and more.

In addition to their professional roles, Fellows also serve as a mentor to ASYV students. Fellows serve as "cousins" in the family environment, working together with family Mamas and counselors to create a loving and supportive family and home environment for our teens. Humanity in Action Fellowship

Fellows participate in intensive three-week educational programs located in cities across Europe and the United States, with approximately 20 local and international students in each program. Each program provides a site-specific curriculum for understanding the historical and cultural context in which challenges to pluralism and liberal democracy occur. The programs are interdisciplinary, collaborative, and engaged learning experiences; they feature lectures and discussions with researchers, journalists, politicians, activists, and artists, as well as site visits to government agencies, non-profit and community organizations, museums, and cultural and memorial sites. The goal of these programs is to foster cross-cultural understanding and an appreciation of different perspectives and approaches for assessing past and contemporary social justice issues.

North American Language and Culture Assistants Program NALCAP

NALCAP offers recipients the opportunity to immerse themselves in the language and culture of Spain while sharing the language and culture of the United States with students in Spain, as well as a tremendous opportunity for professional and personal growth.

American college students and graduates - who are native-like speakers of English - partner with elementary and secondary schools in Spain to bolster language programs, as language assistants (TAs) under the supervision and guidance of teachers in Spain. NALCAP falls under the category of public diplomacy programs. As a language assistant, you will be fulfilling the role of a cultural ambassador as you advance English language learning and mutual understanding through cultural exchange. As such, your role is to encourage students of all ages in Spain to broaden their knowledge of your language and culture.

Placements are offered across Spain, in practically every city and town in the country, running from October 1st to May 31st for most assignments. Short term contracts and/or alternative starting dates are unfortunately not available. Depending on the assigned region, NALCAP recipients receive a monthly stipend of 800 to 1000 euros and medical insurance from either the Ministry of Education of Spain or the regional governments of Spain. Hours of assistant teaching range from 14 to 16 hours per week also depending on the assignment awarded.

Rotary Peace Fellowships

Each year, Rotary awards up to 130 fully funded fellowships for dedicated leaders from around the world to study at one of our peace centers.

Through academic training, practice, and global networking opportunities, the Rotary Peace Centers program develops the capacity of peace and development professionals to become effective catalysts for peace. The fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and internship and field-study expenses.

Two types of fellowships are available: (1) 15-24 month master's degree fellowships at premier universities in fields related to peace and conflict prevention and resolution and (2) a one-year blended learning program for experienced peace and development professionals with diverse backgrounds, earning a post-graduate diploma upon completion of the program.

The ideal candidate is academically strong, has a bachelor's degree in a related field, and has work experience in peace and development. We are looking for early-career candidates who demonstrate a commitment to peace and conflict resolution, can undertake extensive reading and research, and can participate actively within a diverse cohort of students. Successful candidates have a record of prior achievements in peacebuilding as well as the potential for future growth and impact as leaders in the field resulting from their participation in the fellowship. After the program, candidates should be willing to share their own work and experience, staying in touch with peace fellows in their region and maintaining strong connections with Rotary members.

Eligibility: Proficiency in English, second language strongly recommended, excellent leadership skills. Master's degree applicants: three years minimum of related full-time work or volunteer experience, Bachelor's degree. Certificate applicants: five years minimum of full-time work or volunteer experience, strong academic background.
